Columbus AFB Exchange completes remodeling project

The Columbus Air Force Base Exchange recently completed a ten-month renovation project to bring better service and support to its Team BLAZE customers.

The \$2.1 million project, originally slated as a smaller \$850,000 project, was done to address concerns and complaints from its customer base about the 1974-built facility.

Col. George Ross, 14th Flying Training Wing vice commander, said one of the largest items stressed by customers and

addressed with the renovation was the complete overhaul of the stores military clothing section.

The colonel said AAFES has turned a 500 sq. ft. section of military uniform supplies into an over 2,000 sq. ft. area to cover its customers' needs.

He also said this renovation is only one of the numerous things AAFES does to support military members, their families and retirees.

“AAFES supports us here and AAFES supporter us abroad,” Colonel Ross said. “The revenue AAFES gets comes back to the base to support our numerous morale and welfare programs.”

The Columbus AFB Exchange General Manager, Gerell Herron, thanked AAFES customers for putting up with the construction over the past months.

“I know it's been rough shopping during the construction,” he said, “but thank you for your patience.”

Mr. Herron said that while the CAFB Exchange may not be the largest, if someone needs something, they can get it within a few days.

In addition to the expanded military clothing section, the Exchange saw upgrades to its electronics section, a renovation lobby and a larger, redone food court area.

Retired general, former IP speaks at Class 11-01 graduation

A retired general officer and former 50th Flying Training Squadron instructor pilot recently spoke to the graduates and guests of Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 11-01.

Lt. Gen. Walter Buchanan was the guest speaker for the event, speaking about his time here at Columbus AFB, giving advice to the graduates and offering other words of wisdom to the assembled crowd.

“Coming back here (to Columbus AFB) is like coming home,” the general said. “I feel very comfortable here.”

General Buchanan explained it was here that he met his wife, the daughter of a retired master sergeant that would come to be the general’s mentor in the years to come.

“Through him (his father-in-law) I learned that it was the staff sergeants, tech sergeants and frontline Airmen that are what keep the Air Force going,” General Buchanan said. “(As an example)

crew chiefs know more about that airplane (you’ll fly) than you’ll ever know. You literally give the “hand receipt” for your life to that crew chief every time you step to the aircraft.”

The general also offered some advice to the newly-graduated pilots and young officers.

“This is what you’ve been training for since commission,” he said. “Remember there are people that are depending on you to do your jobs.”

He also had some special advice for those selected, like he was, to become first assignment instructor pilots.

“You will mature and grow as a pilot faster than your peers –because you’ll have to,” he said. “To be able to teach someone you have to understand it better than they do. You need to be moments ahead of the plane, to anticipate if you need to take control.”

The general said his assignment as a FAIP was some of the best and most rewarding time he had in his career.

“I loved my assignment here,” he said.

Service Delivery Assessment vital to patient care

WASHINGTON — Patient feedback through the service delivery assessment (SDA), a centralized telephone survey program, provides Air Force clinics with direct, rapid and relevant feedback from their patients vital to national security, Air Force Medical Service officials said.

"Improving the health of Airmen and their families is our mission and patient feedback is vital to our efforts to continuously improve," said Lt. Gen. (Dr.) Bruce Green, Air Force Surgeon General.

Since 2003, the Air Force Medical Service (AFMS) has relied on SDA to assess and improve upon the patient experience at all Air Force clinics. Survey questions are customized by each facility. The results are disseminated in a weekly report to the facility's staff and AFMS leadership.

The weekly report allows Air Force clinics to quickly take corrective action in areas where there are shortcomings or improvement needs. It also helps Air Force clinics understand what is working well at their facility; promote and per-

fect best practices; and share successes with other facilities through lessons learned.

The reports have shown that Air Force health care providers and staff are succeeding in this mission by upholding the highest standards of care and delivering that care with courtesy, respect and dignity to every patient.

The way SDA works is simple. A trained caller contacts the patient by phone within 48 hours after the patient's visit to an Air Force clinic. The interviews are brief (typically less than five minutes) and, as with all matters related to a patient's health, complete patient privacy is maintained.

Questions focus on the patient's observations about the facility and the patient's health care providers, including: Ease of setting the appointment; check-in and wait time; staff courtesy and attention; overall satisfaction with facility; and overall satisfaction with provider.

Through programs like SDA, AFMS can continue to build on successes, and fulfill its pledge to maintain a healthy, steady and ready fighting force.

Be sure your banking and GTC information is accurate in DTS

Please ensure your banking electronic funds transfer (EFT) and government travel card (GTC) account information is accurate prior to processing your travel authorization. To view/update your banking and GTC information while creating a new Travel Authorization, go to "Additional Options" on the top menu, then "My Profile" and finally, "My Account Information".

If you aren't creating a travel authorization, you can still view/update your banking (EFT) and/or GTC information from the DTS home page. Log onto DTS, go to "Traveler Setup", then "Update Personal Profile", and finally, "My Account Information."

Accurate banking and/or GTC account information is required to ensure proper and prompt reimbursement to the traveler. Inaccurate account information can cause payment delays in DTS and

result in late reimbursements to the member and the GTC card, ultimately, causing GTC delinquencies and potentially, non-reimbursable late fees.

- Establishing an "Energy Team" consisting of a Resource Efficiency Manager, an Energy Manager, and an Energy Technician
- Implementing an Energy Conservation Program
- Metering most of the facilities on base in order to trace energy use.
- Shutting down boilers during warm months to conserve natural gas
- Performing facility audits in order to find energy saving opportunities
- Controlling temperature set points to reduce excess heating and cooling

Decorating


- Remove tripping hazards from walking areas

How to Vote Locally

A lot of focus has been put on military and absentee voting the past few months. However, since more than half of the employees on CAFB are civilians, it seems only fair to shed some light on how the local election process works and, as a civilian and resident of Columbus, you should go about voting.

Voting begins at 7 a.m. Nov. 2 and ends at 7 p.m. First, in order to vote in any election you must be registered and be at least 18 years old by the date of the election. In Columbus, you may register to vote by mail or in person. For city residents, Voter Registration is available Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in City Hall, located at 523 Main Street. If you wish to register by mail, you may pick up a form at City Hall or the public library, or you may download one from the Secretary of State's Website at:



Servolution

We all know that acts of terrorism perpetrated on unsuspecting individuals can lead to widespread fear, but many of us have no idea that something even more revolutionary and insidious is taking place right here on Columbus Air Force Base.

I have witnessed with my own eyes several unnecessary and unprovoked random acts of kindness. It is my assertion that there is an asymmetric revolution – a Servolution- beginning to take place in our own back yard. Here I share my observations regarding the clever tactics being used to bring about this Servolution.

Shock and Awe: Random acts of kindness perpetrated upon unsuspecting individuals and groups can lead to positive attitude changes with lasting results. The main objective of the Servolutionists appears to be to do something nice for someone

when they least expect it and without them even knowing who committed the act of service. This goes against most of the things we have been lead to believe about others and leads to shock and awe in individuals and groups. In many cases, the eventual result is that the individuals upon whom the acts were perpetrated catch the spirit and join the Servolution.

Technology: This Servolution appears to require no great technology and can be launched on a shoestring budget. A handwritten, old-fashioned pen-and-paper note can go a long way toward brightening someone's day. A piece of candy or a treat left at someone's workstation yields a similar result.

Numbers: Small groups of people and even individuals can act as sleepers and infiltrate unsuspecting organizations. I personally witnessed someone at a Fun Run who had completed the race and then ran back down the course, encouraging people to hang in there and finish strong. Her obligation was over and she could have sat down to have a cold drink, but instead she put others before herself and kept on running. This is very unusual and shows the incredible drive and determination of those caught up in the Servolution to bring about and further their cause.

Recruiting: I have not seen any blatant recruitment taking place, but my guess is that this Servolution is using methods

such as talking with people individually, especially those who show a susceptibility to their cause. An even craftier technique, though, is targeting people who feel disenfranchised, underappreciated, or like they have no purpose here at CAFB. These targets are then treated with kindness, thereby bringing them into the Servolution cause.

Training: This Servolution trains new recruits without classes or expensive equipment, but on the principle that people learn by watching others. Since most of us learn by observation, the examples of service are impacting others, with some people even acting independently of the larger group and initiating their own personal Servolutions.

Sun Tzu advises in The Art of War, "If [the enemy] is superior in strength, evade him. If his forces are united, separate them. Attack him where he is unprepared; appear where you are not expected."

It seems these are the very tactics the Servolutionists are using. I am not so sure that we will be able to stand against this new and insidious movement, and I am not convinced that we should. It appears that resistance is futile and it may be best to yield and join in. Take a risk, join the Servolution. Commit a random act of kindness today, step back, and watch the results.

Couple epitomizes healthy relationship

KEESLER AIR FORCE BASE, Miss. — At least once a year, I write an article to remind Team Keesler that interpersonal violence is an issue for which all of us share responsibility.

I usually include an overview of the dynamics of partner abuse, some relevant statistics and offer ideas on how everyone can assist in prevention. Since October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month, it's the ideal time to do so. But this year, as a direct result of a recent experience at the 81st Medical Group, my focus is entirely different.

That morning I was, as is typical for me, moving quickly. I was ticking off the day's to do list in my mind as I headed down the hall leading to the hospital's tower exit. I had accomplished what I needed to get done and was already planning my next stop.

I wasn't really paying much attention to the activity around me until I approached my exit.

There, my gaze shifted to the form of a much older gentleman who was slowly pushing a wheelchair toward the tower entrance front doors. I work every weekend in a nursing home so I'm critically aware of the importance of dignity and respect when it comes to honoring a senior's independence. Yet this fellow appeared to be just a slight bit, well ... unsteady.

So as unobtrusively as possible, I quietly took a seat across the open foyer and waited, carefully monitoring just to make sure he wouldn't need my assistance. What I saw next touched me deeply. Slowly, but quite surely, he made his way out to the patient drop-off area in front of the building. Initially I thought he was surely being picked up by a caregiver, but as I watched, I realized he was heading toward a parked car, where an equally elderly woman was waiting. As she glimpsed him approaching, her face simply lit up, a brilliant smile clearly meant solely for him. Smiling back, he made it to her passenger side door, opened it and reached over to unfasten her seat belt.

Exquisitely gentle, he helped her out of the seat, guiding her obviously fragile body with great tenderness. After expertly settling her into the wheelchair, he cradled the top of her head lightly between his hands, where he placed a lingering kiss. Only then did they begin the slow, laborious return to the foyer. I stayed right where I was — just in case — but clearly, they didn't need me. They had each other.

Obviously, I was observing a couple who had been partners for many years. I would say that together they had experienced virtually everything life can dish out — joy, despair, separation, fortune, loss, birth, death and illness. I'll bet if I had asked them, they would have joked about their aging bodies, their increasing dependency, their options for the future. These were very sen-

ior citizens with some serious mileage on their bodies, yet they still looked at each other with obvious appreciation. By the way, in case you're wondering, I had completely forgotten about being unobtrusive by this point. I was openly staring. But in a good way; I was entranced!

What also struck me was their ease with one another, clearly shared, even after all the time they have surely been together. Yet, it was more than that: it was respect, tenderness, gentleness, a generosity of spirit with one another that simply radiated from both of them.

OK, so what does this couple have to do with a domestic violence awareness article?

First, they show us a shining example of what a healthy relationship can look like.

Second, they remind us that sustained, vibrant love isn't about possessiveness, jealousy or ego — everything that a relationship in which violence flourishes is about. It's not about a beautiful unlined face, the sexy six-pack or that hefty bank account. You see, when relationships begin based on the wrong set of principles or unrealistic expectations, it's easy for the foundation to crack. Base it on the things that truly matter, and you can defeat those threats that can ultimately topple a relationship.

Not long ago, Chaplain (Capt.) Mark Robertson and I co-facilitated "Friends for Life," a relationship enhancement class based on the prevention and relationship enhancement program. In the class we stressed one particular

aspect of a healthy relationship. A couple, in order to become truly close, has to get real, to be genuine with each other. Of course, in the process of becoming real we are vulnerable, leaving ourselves open for great injury if our partners choose not to treat us kindly or respectfully.

It's risky, it requires a great deal of trust — but we can decrease risk and protect that closeness by setting standards for safety in the relationship. For example, this should mean no hitting, ever. It means that separation or divorce is never threatened during an argument. Apologies are welcome and accepted graciously. All couples should identify the super sensitive issues and, if necessary, declare them sacred; they will never be used as ammunition in an argument. The bottom line is that emotional and physical safety is critical for both partners, and once achieved, intimacy naturally follows.

The couple I saw in the 81st MDG Hospital ... they have no idea what they generated within me that morning and what they have now created with this article. But I'll bet they would be happy to help. A friend of mine, when I told him about this experience, commented ... "You really are a hopeless romantic!"

Perhaps. Nonetheless, they still reminded me that long-term loving relationships can exist, and that sometimes, in order to learn what not to be, we need to focus on what to be. And I, for one, am grateful that I had the opportunity to slow down and be a witness to the example they gave all of us.

What does the unit manage? MDOS supports the wing mission to Produce Pilots, Advance Airmen, and Feed the Fight. Our day to day operations are geared towards building resiliency and total fitness in the human weapon system. MDOS contains 5 flights including Aerospace and Operational Physiology, Aerospace Medicine, Clinical Medicine, Dental, and Mental Health. Some of the services provided by MDOS staff include preventive medicine, occupational assessments, medical treatment, ocular exams, fitting pilots with glasses, immunizations, responding to emergencies on the flight line, returning pilots to flight status, mental health care, dental exams, fitness prescriptions, diet plans, parachute training, and general medical readiness.

5. Upcoming challenges

The Family Health Clinic will be launching a new initiative termed the Family Health Initiative which is designed to enhance and continue to meet the medical needs of our CAFB population and retirees.

6. How does the unit play a part in SUPT

The 14th MDOS staff interacts with the SUPT students from the very beginning of their CAFB experience. In their first few days of training our staff provide medical and dental evaluations to make sure the students are physically prepared for the demands that face them. Our staff also participates in SUPT training in additional ways including ongoing aerospace medicine assessment and treatment, aerospace physiology training, and altitude chamber and egress training. In addition, 14th MDOS supports CAFB staff to make sure that they are medically ready to provide the ongoing training necessary to produce pilots and feed the fight.


