Here we go again, another soup-de-jour, fad of the day practice that focuses on a broken process. Little did I know the

focus would shift away from the process, to reducing the task load of the Airman of Columbus Air Force Base.

The big "A" Airman is the hardworking, dedicated, mission driven civilian or military member without whom this base would grind to a halt. Bio: Maj. Gen. Edward R. "Buster" Ellis



Maj. Gen. Edward R. "Buster" Ellis retired as Commander, 19th Air Force, Air Education and Training Command, Randolph Air Force Base, Texas. He was responsible for the day-to-day training of approximately 2,000 U.S. and allied students. The students range from entry-level flying training through advanced combat crew training, and ultimately become fully qualified aircrew personnel for the warfighting commands. The 19th Air Force is composed of more than 24,000 Total Force personnel and 1,450 aircraft assigned to 11 wings and two independent training groups located across the United States.

General Ellis is a native of Montgomery, Ala. He entered the Air Force in July 1971 after receiving his commission through the University of

Alabama ROTC program. He has held a number of command, flying and staff positions. In 1999, General Ellis served as the night director of the Balkans Combined Air Operations Center in Vicenza, Italy, during Operation Allied Force. In 2001, he was assigned as Commander, Combined Task Force Operation Northern Watch at Incirlik Air Base, Turkey, enforcing United Nations' sanctions on the Saddam Hussein regime in northern Iraq. There General Ellis commanded a task force comprising A-10A, C-130, E-3B, EA-6B, F-16CG, F-16J, F-15C, F-15E, KC-135E/R and Royal Air Force Jaguars.

General Ellis is a command pilot with more than 3,300 flying hours, including 240 combat hours in the F-15C and F-15E in support of Operation Northern Watch.



Records Review

It is very important for every individual to be vigilant in making sure their personal information and records are up to date.

Virtual Military Personnel Flight

You should check these items in virtual MPF on the Air Force Portal regularly to ensure your records are up to date.

-Awards and Decorations: Bring in certificates or other documentation to the MPS to be updated.

-Duty History: Can be updated through virtual MPF

-Record Review/Update: Visit MPS customer service with questions regarding your records

-Data Verification Brief: Visit MPS Customer Service with questions regarding your records

-Record of Emergency Data: The Virtual Record of Emergency Data (vRED) satisfies the requirement of the DD Form 93, and is the official source document required by law for you to provide the Air Force with emergency contact information in the event you become a casualty and for designating beneficiaries for certain benefits in the event of your death. It is your responsibility to keep this information current,

and completion of this program is mandatory. If any of the information changes, the vRED should be updated as soon as possible. Delays in next of kin notification are most often associated with incomplete or outdated information.

The accuracy of your records will impact you and those you love. Don't leave these things in the hands of someone else. Do it today!

AAF receives first fixed wing trainers

SHINDAND, Afghanistan — The first three aircraft slated as initial trainers for the Afghan Air Force undergraduate pilot training program arrived at Shindand Air Base today, marking a historic day for Afghanistan and its nascent Air Force.

Arriving in front of onlookers including Afghan and coalition leadership, the three Cessna 182 Turbo aircraft, are the first of six to be used as initial flight training aircraft, with six additional Cessna 208B's scheduled to arrive over the coming months as the fixed wing follow-on trainer.

In addition to the fixed wing program, there will be six MD-530 light helicopters delivered later this year, devoted to the rotary wing portion of UPT. These aircraft, along with six Mi-17 helicopters, will be used for advanced follow-on training. The initial instructor cadre of the training program is staffed by a handful of U.S. Air Force, coalition and Afghan instructors.

In 2009, the Afghanistan Ministry of Defense selected its first group of pilot candidates on which to build its future Air Force. Absent any indigenous training resources or facilities, the future pilots were sent to the U.S. where they were enrolled in language immersion training, followed by U.S. Air Force undergraduate pilot training.

According to officials, the AAF has begun a new and exciting chapter in its history by officially beginning its first-ever Afghan Flight School.

"Six years ago we had nothing, and today we are receiving our first three training aircraft," Major General Abdul Wahab Wardak,

Afghan Air Force Commander, stated in his speech during the arrival of the C-182T's. "I once looked out to see our Air force scattered across Afghanistan, today we have brought our Air force back together here at Shindand, the only Air Force training base in Afghanistan."

Wahab went on to thank the coalition and all of the advisers for helping them reach this historic occasion.

Officials also indicated the arrival of these first aircraft is a momentous step towards the creation of a self-sufficient, Afghan led flying training center of excellence at Shindand AB; a crucial piece in the development of a fully independent and operationally-capable Air Force.

Shindand AB will not only be the center for pilot training, but will eventually serve as the training center for much of the AAF.

Included in the training center will be maintenance, language and professional military education as well as training and support functions and skills necessary for nearly 1,400 Shindand Air Wing Airmen to sustain base and flight-school operations.

"This is a huge task, developing an entire UPT program from the ground-up, to include infrastructure, aircraft, maintenance and personnel. But it is of the utmost importance to ensure it is done right in order to establish long-term sustainment of the AAF," said Lt. Col. James Mueller, 444th Air Expeditionary Advisory Squadron Commander. "One of the most obvious signs of the importance of the mission and the long-term impact it will have on the AAF is the international coalition support you see here (in Shindand). The U.S., Italian and Hungarian Air Forces as well as the U.S. Army and civilians are working hand-in-hand with our Afghan counterparts to ensure the future success of Shindand AB."

Editor's note: Shindand Air Base, Afghanistan now has six simulators and 3 Cessna 182s and are expecting three more aircraft every 10 days until a total of 12 trainers and six operational 208s are on station. Afghan AAC Pilot Training is scheduled to formally begin in December, with some limited training to begin by mid October. In addition to starting the UPT program, they are standing up The first operational Cessna 208 squadron to start running light airlift across western Afghanistan. Effort in part due to the hard work of two deployed 37th Flying Training Squadron Bengal Tiger instructor pilots.

Hispanic Heritage... Many Stories

Hispanic History Month POC

As we celebrate the culture of Hispanic Americans this month, we can't help but acknowledge the sacrifices made by Hispanics as part of our armed forces.

One of the 500,000 Hispanics to serve in World War II was Sgt. 1st Class Augustin Ramos Calero, who was nicknamed a "One Man Army" by his comrades. In a battle within the borders of France, Calero single-handedly killed eleven Germans and captured another twenty-one. He earned twenty-two medals, including a Silver Star and a Purple Heart, making him the most decorated Latino in World War II.


During the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution in the Vietnam War, Lt. j.g. Everett Alvarez, Jr., an A4C Skyhawk pilot, was hit by enemy fire and became the first American pilot shot down over North Vietnam and the conflict's first Prisoner of War. Alvarez became one of the longest-held prisoners of war in American history and was not released for almost nine years. When he finally returned home, Alvarez received a hero's welcome and was awarded the Silver Star, two Legions of Merit, two Bronze Stars, the Distinguished Flying Cross, and two Purple Hearts.

On the day he was officially recognized as a U.S. resident, Mexican-born Sgt. Rafael Peralta joined the Marines. He served in Iraq and went on to become a hero in a November 2004 assault in Fallujah. While serving as a scout team leader, he was shot multiple times in a firefight. As he fell to the floor, insurgents threw a grenade into the room. Peralta managed to pull the grenade under his body, killing him, but saving the lives of his fellow Marines. For undaunted courage and intrepid fighting spirit, Peralta was awarded the second highest American medal—the Navy Cross.

While there are countless other heroic stories of Hispanic American service members, these few serve as examples that no matter what someone's heritage may be, the ideas of service before self and sacrifice in defense of freedom still exist in the hearts of all men. As Peralta's story shows, you don't even have to be born here to realize that there are things America represents that are worth fighting for.

Stop, think — we all play a role in cyber defense

KEESLER AIR FORCE BASE, Miss. — Today we rely heavily on cyberspace to complete our mission. We access a myriad of information through cyberspace, from finances, transportation and training, to personnel movements and emergency response data. As technology increases our ability to access information, it also increases our vulnerabilities. The Department of Defense has been making strides to increase the security of our networks and protect our government information.

The information available through our DOD systems must be protected. We need to protect disclosure of personal information. We often hear about protecting Social Security numbers and financial information. Given the large presence of medical personnel at Keesler, we also hear about the importance of guarding against divulging health information to unauthorized persons.

Imagine the impact

But what impact would it have on operational security or terrorist threats? What would happen if our adversaries, such as foreign governments seeking dominance or terrorist organizations trying to further their agendas, were to access our data? Would it be important to these groups to know what we're teaching our Airmen about network protection or what type of weather equipment our personnel are using down range? What about the number of folks forward deployed? Would any of this be useful to an adversarial group planning an attack?

The U.S. government found that past physical attacks have been performed in conjunction with cyber attacks. Adversaries have attempted to attack and render vital command and control systems ineffective in detection and responses to physical attacks.

Major security threat

In the International Strategy for Cyberspace document released in May, President Barack Obama comments, "The digital world is no longer a lawless frontier, nor the province of a small elite ... this space continues to grow, develop and promote prosperity, security and openness ... this is why it is so important to protect." The growing number of attacks on our cyber networks has become, in President Obama's words, "one of the most serious economic and national security threats

our nation faces."

So, how do you help prevent the disclosure of sensitive information? The most important things each of us can do — stop and think. Pay attention to the websites you visit, the data you store and the information you send via email.

The Aug. 5 threat bulletin from the 624th Operations Center explained that a simple thing like visiting what you believe to be the Air Force Portal can result in unknowingly revealing personally identifiable information if the user is unaware of the warning signs. For more information about what to watch for when accessing official DOD Web sites, review the Cyber Threat Bulletin under the Cyber tab on the Air Force Portal.

Beyond thinking about the data we protect and the websites we visit, do you think about physical security? Do you challenge unknown individuals in your areas that are accessing government computers? What about people accessing secured rooms or closets that hold network infrastructure?

In a June 20 memo, Secretary of the Air Force Michael Donley and Chief of Staff Gen. Norton Schwartz stated, "Cyberspace pervades everything we do, in every domain, and extends from your workspace to the battlespace."

Pervasive nature of cyberspace

Because of the pervasive nature of cyberspace, it can no longer be left only to the technicians to ensure its security. Instead, it's the responsibility of each and every user. The Air Force has made strides in improving user awareness of this inherent responsibility by requiring information assurance training.

Air Force Instruction 33-115V2 requires all DOD military members, civilians and contractors to complete information assurance training, with annual refresher training. This training is intended to keep users informed of the potential risks associated with computer access and how to avoid inadvertent release of information to our adversaries. While it won't eliminate all mistakes, it will make you more aware of the risks and reduce your chances of falling prey to a phishing scheme or malicious logic attack. You may have already experienced the impact of failing to complete your training on time by finding that your user account has expired and being unable to log on to the network until it's done. Training required to obtain access to the network is standardized in the Air Force Information Assurance Awareness Training computer-

based training course on the Advanced Distributed Learning Service. Other armed service information assurance type training doesn't satisfy this requirement.

During this mandatory training, you'll learn that malicious logic comes in many varieties and is typically an intrusion intended to perform an unauthorized function that causes harm to your computer or network. Some common forms of malicious logic are viruses, denial of service attacks, spyware and phishing.

Viruses, service denial, spyware, phishing

A virus is capable of attaching to disks or other files and replicating itself repeatedly, typically without user knowledge or permission. Viruses are spread through many means, but most commonly through email and websites. A denial of service attack is caused by generation of a lot of network traffic and "clogging" the communication lines or a system or service, making it unavailable to users. Spyware is intended to aid in gathering information about a person or organization without their knowledge while phishing schemes, also known as "social hacking," target individuals by tricking them into giving away information.

While there are automated tools in place to combat these types of malicious logic attacks, including antivirus software and intrusion detection devices, the most effective method is making sure you are educated! Users are the network's best source of defense; if you're armed with the right knowledge and aware of

the potential pitfalls, you can help defend our network.

Things to remember

Be aware of to whom you are releasing information. In the age of social networking, phishing has become very prevalent. Don't release personal or government information unless the requestor has a true need to know. Be leery of email from unknown sources and don't open attachments from unconfirmed sources, emails without subject lines and non-DOD sources. Don't provide your username or password to anyone. There's no need to share this information with anyone. Avoid using your Air Force email address as login usernames or as a means of contact for non-DOD accounts.

In a July DOD news release, Defense Secretary Leon Panetta said, "It is critical to strengthen our cyber capabilities to address the cyber threats we're facing." The release noted that more than 60,000 new malicious software programs or variations are identified every day threatening our security, our economy and our citizens.

Do you know what to do if you suspect your system has been affected by some type of malicious code or if you've been the victim of a phishing scheme? Immediately report the incident to your unit information assurance officer, computer security manager or the 81st Communications Squadron's communications focal point, 376-8627.

Our network is only as secure as its weakest link; don't be the weakest link!

The 14th FTW celebrates 64 years of Air Power

Airmen from the 14th Flying Training Wing here celebrated the 64th birthday of the Air Force Sept. 16 at the Trotter Convention Center by reflecting on the past, enjoying the present and looking ahead to the future during the wing's Air Force Ball.

Air Force Vice Chief of Staff Gen. Phil Breedlove visited Columbus Air Force Base to celebrate the occasion with Team BLAZE as the event's guest speaker and to talk about some of the things he has seen as the service's vice chief of staff.

"Many of you are a part of the new generation of military leaders—Americans who have chosen to join the service during an era in which we have been in sustained combat for a decade," Breedlove said during his remarks.

The Air Force has, in fact, been in a period of continuous combat for the last two decades, Breedlove said, as part of Operation Desert Storm and in enforcing the no-fly zones in Iraq that followed.

"With the exception of a few of us old guys, the Air Force has been at war for our entire career," he said. "Most of our captains, majors, lieutenant colonels, and colonels have never known an Air Force that was not at war."

Airmen today are committed to the joint fight, and will do whatever it takes to help their fellow servicemembers, Breedlove said.

"The 'contract' we make with our ground combatants these days is, if you go into combat and you need us, we will be there in less than ten minutes," he said. "Today in southern Afghanistan, when a Marine calls for Air Force or Marine air support, the average response time from call

to steel and fire on the enemy is eight-and-a-half minutes."

Another example of the Air Force's commitment to excellence can be seen in the Air Force Personnel Rescue teams in Afghanistan, who regularly save lives by quickly moving wounded out of the battlefield, Breedlove said.

"They guarantee that they will get any Soldier, Sailor, Airman or Marine who is down on the battlefield, no matter where they are, to the medical care they need in what we call the golden hour," the general said.

Getting patients to advanced-level treatment facilities in those first 60 minutes after being wounded is critical, the general said. As an example, statistics show that patients who live to receive treatment at the theater hospital at Bagram Airfield have a 98 percent chance of survival.

"That is the story of your Air Force,"

Breedlove said.

The general recognized the importance of the Air Force's enlisted corps, noting that the service's senior noncommissioned officers are vital to ensuring the Air Force can continue to protect the nation and its freedoms.

Breedlove also compared today's Air Force to the one he entered as a young second lieutenant, telling the audience the service is more capable that it has ever been, but that much more will be asked of Airmen in the years ahead.

"Seeing the accomplishments of Team BLAZE and the Columbus community, I am confident in the ability of this Air Force to succeed in the tough times ahead," Breedlove said. "By living our core values of integrity, service and excellence, I'm sure you will continue to make the U.S. Air Force the most lethal and effective air force the world has ever seen."


"We are grateful for this partnership and the benefits it brings to our capability," Donley said.
