

The Columbus Air Force Base Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Office (SAPR) would like to harness what we call "The Power of YOUR Uniform" to fight against sexual assault beginning April 1 for Sexual Assault Awareness Prevention Month (SAAPM).

Sexual Assault Awareness Prevention Month is rapidly approaching, and we have developed several prevention opportunities to help jump start our annual campaign of "The Power of YOUR Uniform". Col. Seth Graham, 14th Flying Training Wing Commander, will host the opening ceremony with the signing of our Sexual Assault Proclamation followed by a Columbus AFB Airmen Storyteller, SSgt Kory Talbert, in the Kaye Auditorium at 10 a.m. on 1 April.

SSgt. Kory Talbert, 14th Communications Squadron Quality Assurance Section Chief, is no stranger to our sexual assault community team. Talbert is a Columbus AFB Sexual Assault Victim Advocate who embodies courage, resiliency, empathy, and honor. He will share his 20-year journey about being sexually assaulted at the age 11 and how the Air Force

"It is a continuous journey, but I must be intentional. I know I wouldn't be here today if it wasn't for those people who met me where I was on my journey," said Talbert. "I have taken full advantage of the opportunities and resources the Air Force has to offer."

"The Sexual Assault Prevention and Response team is on point when they ask you and me: 'Do you know the power of YOUR uniform?" I do," Talbert said. "Like me, you have an opportunity to be the best version of yourself every day while serving in the greatest Air Force in the World."

The Columbus Air Force Base SAPR team is passionate about helping Airmen navigate through sexual trauma and eliminating sexual assault in the military. They continuously advocate, collaborate and educate on sexual assault awareness and prevention, victim reporting, accountability, victim advocacy, and training and education.

From Then to Now: A History of Airshows

The "Wings Over Columbus" Air Show and STEM Expo is quickly approaching. There are several world-class performers, aircraft displays, and educational activities to take in during the event weekend on 26-27 March 2022. This year, the United States Air Force celebrates 75 years of breaking barriers, advancements in aviation technology and projection of global air power. However, the air shows of today wouldn't exist without the long, rich aviation history that can be traced back to the beginnings of flight.

In August 1909, the "Grande Semaine d'Aviation de la Champagne," or the "Rheims Aviation Meeting" was held at a racetrack in Rheims, France. The week-long spectacle is considered to be the first international aviation meeting, which drew aviators from all over the world to compete for prizes in aviation-related challenges. Many famous early pilots participated and the event was a success, drawing thousands of spectators and new aviation fans that camped in

After World War I, pilots began performing at travelling air shows. These events were used to advance the field of aviation by providing a means to inspire and educate the next generation of future aviators. Travelling air shows, also called circuses, were small and traveled from town to town and usually coincided with a "Victory Loan" or "War Bonds" rally. In addition to the educational purpose of the shows, many different types of acts began to surface, such as wing walkers and air races. In later years, air shows provided entertainment during national holidays such as Armistice Day or George Washington's birthday celebrations.

The modern air show combines the best of military and civilian aerial performers to celebrate the advancement and history of flight. Aerial performers like the United States Air Force Thunderbirds and Air Combat Command A-10C Thunderbolt

Over 30 technology and education partners have come together to exhibit advancements in virtual reality, engineering, unmanned vehicle systems, forensics, military aviation and space.

"The air show provides a unique regional recurring and public outreach opportunity for the Air Force," Thoren said "Our local community partners have played a pivotal role in planning and hosting this air show, just as they have for decades supporting Columbus AFB and our critical mission. CAFB raises the bar with STEM

14th Flying Training Wing Public Affairs

The 14th Flying Training Wing will host the "Wings Over Columbus" Air Show and first large scale Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics (STEM) Expo 26-27 March

The STEM Expo is the largest event of its kind held at Columbus AFB in conjunction with the air show. Over 30 STEM exhibitors in the fields of aviation, engineering, robotics, forensics, military sciences unmanned vehicles and cyber will be on display throughout the event.

"The thing that makes this event so special is actually what is going to happen on the 25th of March," said Tech. Sgt. Javier Cruz, 14th Flying Training Wing, NCOIC Public Affairs & "Wings Over Columbus" STEM Expo coordinator. "As the STEM coordinator I saw an opportunity to take advantage of the performer practice day. I was inspired by Naval Air Station OCEANA in Virginia. They host a very large STEM day on their air show practice day and I wanted to do that here at Columbus. The STEM Expo runs all weekend but the 25th is just for the students."

Over 540 high school and college students pre-registered to attend the student-only STEM Expo day.

"So far we have about 20 schools signed up for the student only day," said Cruz. "It might not sound like a lot, but when I started this project I initially reached out to over 153 schools. Rock Air Force Base." COVID has been a major factor in preventing some schools from being able to participate."

The STEM Expo is an unfunded air show activity and currently does not meet the requirements to receive sponsorships.

Establishing partnerships within the local community provided solutions to unfunded STEM Expo initiatives.

she saw the patch design on my wall and next thing I know the whole 331st RCS is trying to figure out a way to get these mission patches made. Staff Sgt. Watasha McAfee, Tech. Sgt. Janyll Jasmine Smiling and Master Sgt. Clayton Jackson were the MVPs and within a few days we were looking at a real-life proof sample of the STEM mission patch. That's when I knew we had something special."

"To some it may be just a patch, keepsake or memorabilia." To those who understand the bigger picture, it's a movement," said Staff Sgt. Watasha McAfee, 331st Recruiting Squadron, Air Force recruiter. "A movement that will inspire, empower and encourage these talented young students to carry the torch and become this great nation's next leaders."

The STEM zone will consist of two areas, an indoor hangar will house the 14th Flying Training Wing mission row where students will be able to interact with current Air Force student pilots, virtual reality 360 degree flights, flight simulators and a T-38 Talon. Additional exhibits such as BOEING, Xipiter Unmanned Aerial Systems, Mississippi State University Society of Women Engineers and Chandra X-Ray Observatory will be available. An outdoor exhibit area will provide students an opportunity to interact with Unmanned Aerial Vehicles from Mississippi State, an Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team and robot, a Quad-Legged Unmanned Ground Vehicle from the 325th Fighter Wing, Security Forces squadron, AIRBUS Helicopter, Federal Bureau of Investigation mobile forensics lab and other larger outdoor STEM exhibits.

"Train World Class Pilots," said Cruz. "It's a simple mission statement because the standard is no less. I brought that mindset into the planning of this event to really bring the wow factor for these students. If even just one student leaves



procedures, takeoff and landing procedures, aerobatics and formation flying. Students also practice night, instrument and cross country navigation flying.

Primary training takes approximately 23 weeks and includes 254.4 hours of ground training, 27.3 hours in the flight simulator and 89 hours in the T-6A aircraft.

After primary training, students select, by order of merit, advanced training in the fighter-bomber or airlift-tanker track.

Both tracks are designed to best train pilots for successful transition to


their follow-on aircraft and mission.

Advanced training for the fighter track is done in the T-38C Talon, a tandem-seat, twin-engine supersonic jet. T-38 training emphasizes formation, advanced aerobatics and navigation. Training takes approximately 26 weeks and includes Xenia, Ohio 381 hours of ground training, 31.6 hours in the C-17 flight simulator and 118.7 hours in the T-38C aircraft.

The airlift-tanker track uses the T-1A Jayhawk, the military version of a multi-place Beech let 400 business jet. Instruction centers on crew coordina-

tion and management, instrument training, cross-country flying and simulated refueling and airdrop missions. Training takes about 26 weeks and includes 185 hours of ground training, 53.6 **1st Lt.
