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Col. Clinton ZumBrunnen to speak at SUPT Class's 20-03 Graduation

Col. Clinton ZumBrunnen, 437th Airlift Wing commander at Joint Base Charleston, South Carolina, is the graduation speaker for Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 20-03's graduation ceremony Nov. 15 in the Kaye Auditorium on Columbus Air Force Base, Mississippi. The 437th Airlift Wing deploys Airmen and aircraft worldwide in support of contingency operations that involve the airland and airdrop delivery of forces, equipment, and supplies.

These missions support combat operations, Joint Chiefs of Staff-directed special operations missions and United States centure Federal Services, Arlington, Va. sponsored humanitarian relief efforts.

Col ZumBrunnen received his commission as a distinguished graduate from the United States Air Force Academy in 1998. Col ZumBrunnen is also a graduate of the Olmsted Scholar program. He studied Hebrew at the Defense Language Institute before attending Tel Aviv University for two an Israeli university in a program taught entirely in Hebrew. He was the special assistant to the B,S.C. Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and has commanded at the squadron and group levels.

Marker placed to honor 60th anniversary of Columbus crash

14th Flying Training Wing Public Affairs HARDINSBURG, Ky. — In 1959, the U.S. was in the

competitive Cold War with the Soviet Union to be the indomitable force of nuclear power; and as part of the feud, Columbus Air Force Base, Mississippi, fed the fight by flying bombing missions as the 4228th Strategic Wing.

With every war comes risks and the will to sacrifice. On Oct. 15, 1959, eight Airmen assigned to Columbus AFB paid the ultimate price on one of their missions.

Twelve different, simulated-bombing missions were conducted daily at Columbus AFB to ensure the readiness of the pilots. During these missions, crew members would have to endure a peril and innovative feat: a Boeing KC-135A Stratotanker would refuel a B-52 Stratofortress midair.

While refueling on one of the training missions, there was a mishap, causing the combustion of the two planes from Columbus AFB. The accident took place around 6:46 p.m. outside the town of Hardinsburg, Kentucky.

Sixty years later, Oct. 15, 2019, family members of the crew and locals of Hardinsburg gathered to unveil a road side marker commemorating the Airmen and their sacrifice. Three family members of the fallen Airmen helped unveil the

On the marker, one side reads:

"B-52-KC-135A MID-AIR COLLISION—On October 15, 1959, Kentucky experienced the Cold War firsthand. Above Hardinsburg, KY, A B-52 bomber collided with a KC-

135 tanker during a mid-air refueling. The two aircraft were flying a training mission with two nuclear weapons aboard. These armed missions would allow aircraft to hit assigned Soviet targets if the U.S. was attacked."

On the other side it reads:

"After impact, the B-52 instructor pilot, pilot, electronic warfare officer, and radar navigator successfully ejected and were the only survivors. The other four B-52 crew members were unable to eject and were fatally injured. None of the four crew members from the KC-135 survived the collision. The nuclear weapons were recovered intact the wreckage."

There was a combined total of 12 Airmen on board the B-52 and KC-135A. Only four of them were able to eject safely and parachute down toward the Kentucky fields.

Few witnesses below were able to comprehend the catastrophe as an aircraft crash. News reports state locals flooded Kentucky law enforcement agencies with calls, exclaiming what they had seen. Most reports state they had seen a UFO, a meteorite or a Russian "Sputnik" satellite.

Both of the flaming aircraft battered the ground 12 miles See MARKER, Page 7

Smoking, diabetes: The connection between 2 U.S. epidemics

The increase in diabetes in the U.S. to epidemic levels has gained a lot of attention in recent years. Over 29 million Americans have the disease and many more (1 in 3 adults) are at risk of developing it in the next five years (known as pre-diabetes).

People with diabetes have bodies that can't make or use insulin—a hormone that turns glucose (sugar) from the food you eat into energy. Over time, high blood sugar levels can damage organs such as your kidney, heart, blood vessels and eyes. This damage can cause these organs to malfunction or fail—one reason why diabetes is one of the top 10 causes of death in

Smoking increases the risk of developing diabetes because it can change how your body processes and regulates sugar. Smoking can also make it harder to control your blood sugar levels if you have diabetes. If you smoke, you have a 30 to 40 percent higher chance of developing diabetes than someone who has never

For those that already have diabetes, smoking increases your risk of organ damage, as well as your chances of having a heart attack or stroke.

- Smoking can double your risk of developing kidnev damage compared to nonsmokers.
- Smoking increases the risk of diabetic eye disease (called diabetic retinopathy). Smoking reduces blood circulation. When this happens to the retina, light sensing cells in the eye are damaged, causing blindness.
- Both diabetes and smoking increase your chances of developing pancreatic cancer, which is fatal in 95 percent of cases. If you have diabetes and you smoke, your risk of pancreatic cancer is even higher than if you only smoked or were a nonsmoking di-
- Diabetes and cigarette smoking are major risk factors for heart attack and stroke. If you're diabetic and you smoke, your chances of having a heart attack or stroke are higher than if you were just a smoker, or a nonsmoking diabetic.

The KC-10 Extender is an Air Mobility Command advanced tanker and cargo aircraft designed to provide in- a wide variety of U.S. and allied military aircraft within the creased global mobility for U.S. armed forces. Although the KC-10's primary mission is aerial refueling, it can combine the operations tasks of a tanker and cargo aircraft by refueling fighters and simultaneously carry the fighter support personnel and equipment on overseas deployments. The KC-10 is also capable of transporting litter and ambulatory patients using patient support pallets during aeromedical evacuations.

Features

The KC-10 can transport up to 75 people and nearly 170,000 pounds (76,560 kilograms) of cargo a distance of about 4,400 miles (7,040 kilometers) unrefueled.

In addition to the three main DC-10 wing fuel tanks, to increase its delivery range. the KC-10 has three large fuel tanks under the cargo floor, one under the forward lower cargo compartment, one in the center wing area and one under the rear compartment. Combined, the capacity of the six tanks carries more than 356,000 pounds (160,200 kilograms) of fuel - almost twice as much as the KC-135 Stratotanker.

Using either an advanced aerial refueling boom, or a hose and drogue centerline refueling system, the KC-10 can refuel same mission. The aircraft is equipped with lighting for night

The KC-10's boom operator controls refueling operations through a digital, fly-by wire system. Sitting in the rear of the aircraft, the operator can see the receiver aircraft through a wide window. During boom refueling operations, fuel is transferred to the receiver at a maximum rate of 1,100 gallons (4,180 liters) per minute; the hose and drogue refueling maximum rate is 470 gallons (1,786 liters) per minute. The automatic load alleviation and independent disconnect systems greatly enhance safety and facilitate air refueling. The KC-10 can be air-refueled by a KC-135 or another KC-10A

outside of Hardinsburg about two miles apart. There were no documented injuries from civilians. A single close-call was reported by a farmer saying part of the B-52's engine im- ed: pacted the ground nearly 50 feet from where he stood.

Two of the surviving Airmen were taken in by locals and transported to a Critchelow's Store in Glen Dean, Kentucky. There, the Airmen made phone calls to Columbus, telling the tragedy.

The other two survivors landed nearby at the farm of a man named Russel Morgan, in a grove of trees and were rescued.

Once the news was received by Columbus AFB and Strategic Air Command headquarters, Air Force personnel sent doctors to recover the survivors the following day.

Dispatch teams from Barksdale AFB, Louisiana; Offutt AFB, Nebraska; Fort Knox, Kentucky; the Kentucky National Guard and several other agencies were sent to gather wreckage and assess the scene.

The Atomic Energy Commission was sent to recover two unarmed nuclear warheads being toted on the B-52. They secured the warheads, and on the same day the bodies

of the other eight Airmen were discovered. The bodies were declared deceased by a local county coroner and were issued death certif-



The 52-week pilot training program begins with a six-week preflight phase of academics and physiological training to prepare students for flight. The second phase, primary training, is conducted in the single-engine, turboprop T-6A Texan II at Columbus AFB, Miss. Students learn aircraft flight characteristics, emergency procedures, takeoff and landing procedures, aerobatics and formation flying. Students also practice night, instrument and cross country navigation

> Primary training takes approximately 23 weeks and includes 254.4 hours of ground training, 27.3 hours in the flight simulator and 89 hours in the T-6A aircraft.

After primary training, students select, by order of merit, advanced training in the fighter-bomber or airlift-tanker


Both tracks are designed to best train pilots for successful transition to their follow-on aircraft and mission.

Advanced training for the fighter track is done in the T-38C Talon, a tandem-seat, twin-engine supersonic jet. T-38 training emphasizes formation,

advanced aerobatics and navigation. Training takes approximately 26 weeks and includes 381 hours of ground training, 31.6 hours in the flight simulator and 118.7 hours in the

T-38C aircraft. The airlift-tanker track uses the T-1A Jayhawk, the military version of a multi-place Beech Jet 400 business jet. Instruction centers on crew coordination and management, instrument


training, cross-country flying and simulated refueling and airdrop missions. Training takes about 26 weeks and includes 185 hours of ground training, 53.6 hours in the flight simulator and 76.4 hours in the T-1A.


