

Know your supplements, it could cost you

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. — Airmen should be careful when taking dietary supplements — because of the potential health risks, but also because they could lead to a positive urinalysis test result, according to officials with Air Force Reserve Command's Medical Services Directorate and staff judge advocate's office.

"You really need to do your homework and check with your doctor before taking any kind of supplement," said Dr. Don Jenrette, the AFRC's Drug Demand Reduction Program manager. "And you should know all of the ingredients that are in any supplement you might be taking."

Dietary supplements are intended to provide nutrients that may otherwise not be consumed in sufficient quantities. The most common supplements are vitamins. Other popular supplements promise help in gaining or losing weight, or in improving athletic or sexual performance.

Jenrette said he and his DDR specialists in the field are often asked if there is a list of dietary supplements that are banned or illegal for use by military members.

He said that Air Force Instruction 90-507, "Military Drug Demand Reduction Program," specifically bans any supplement that contains hemp and hemp seeds or hemp seed oil, but there is not a comprehensive list of banned supplements by name. He did say, however, that the Defense Department is clear about what substances are banned for use by U.S. military service members.

According to the DOD's Human Performance Resource Center website, substances banned for use by Airmen, Soldiers, Sailors, Marines and Coast Guard members include:

■ Anything on the Drug Enforcement Agency's controlled substance list — this includes spice, marijuana, synthetic cannabinoids, amphetamines, mood-altering substances and anabolic steroids

"(Airmen) who take supplements that contain any of the illegal or illicit drugs on this list are in danger of testing positive during routine urinalysis screening,' Ienrette said.

- Any substance the Food and Drug Administration has declared "illegal" or "not allowed" for use in dietary supplements — such as ephedra/ephedrine alkaloids, DMAA, DMBA and BMPEA
- Salvia divinorum, commonly known as diviner's sage
- Any prescription drug without a current prescription written specifically for the individual

"(Airmen) who take supplements that contain any of the illegal or illicit drugs on this list are in danger of testing positive during routine urinalysis screening," Jenrette said.

He added that some supplement companies may not list all of the ingredients in their products.

"Positive urinalysis results due to dietary supplement use can occur because products on the market may contain undeclared drug ingredients – that is, controlled substances that are not stated/listed on the product label," according to the HPRC website.

"The FDA has found that many dietary supplements — es-products — contain undeclared drug ingredients that could be potentially harmful and/or produce unwanted urinalysis test results," according to the website.

Jenrette said Airmen need to pay especially close attention to supplements that contain hemp seed or hemp seed oil. Hemp is the plant that naturally contains the substance tetrahydrocannabinol (THC, the psychoactive ingredient in

According to AFI 90-507, "Studies have shown that products made with hemp seed and hemp seed oil may contain varying levels of THC, an active ingredient in marijuana that is detectable under the Air Force Drug Testing Program. In order to ensure military readiness, the ingestion of products containing or products derived from hemp seed or hemp seed

Having a positive drug test due to the ingestion of hemp seed products can be detrimental to an Airman's career, explained Maj. Ryan Haslam, an attorney with AFRC's staff judge advocate's office.

"Arguing that you popped positive for THC due to hemp seed use can still get you discharged because it is a failure to observe the prohibitions in AFI 90-507 and, as a result, a violation of Article 92 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice,"

Military members should be mindful that products containing hemp seeds or hemp seed oil can be found at health food stores, including those located on military bases.

"Military members need to read the product label prior to consumption to make sure it doesn't contain hemp seed or hemp seed oil," Jenrette said.

Studying the label is good advice for anyone thinking of taking a supplement. Buying only from reputable, well-established supplement manufacturers is also recommended. Getting a doctor's opinion is another piece of good advice.

"Common sense is key when we talk about supplements," about what you put into your body. If you're not 100 percent sure that what you are taking is safe and does not contain any illegal ingredients, stay away from it."

AF moving forward with restructure of missileer career field

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. — The command er of Air Force Global Strike Command directed a review of the nuclear and missile operations career field earlier this year, with the goal of creating a self-sustaining career field.


"As we move forward with this restructure, we're going to be making changes that will grow nuclear experience and expertise at the wing level; developing our missile operators into the nuclear 'go-to' experts needed across the Air Force and the nuclear enterprise when it comes to policies and procedures," Cotton said.

The first step in the restructure will reduce the number of accessions into the 13N career field, balancing accessions with retention to eliminate virtually all crossflows. In the past, more 13Ns were accessed than needed, with the knowledge that 30 to 40 percent of the officers would crossflow into other career fields after their initial four-year commitment.

"In recent years, efforts to reinvigorate the nuclear enterprise have led to more missileers wanting to stay in the career field," Cotton said. "The Air Force has also made an overt effort to do more recruiting at the (U.S.) Air Force Academy and other universities, informing cadets about the missile career field, and those efforts have been very successful."

As the 13N restructure progresses, adjustments will be made to grade structures across the entire career field to ensure a more senior crew force at the wing level. This redistribution, combined with additional leadership opportunities

such as being a flight commander, provides increased nuclear prise," he said.

Purchasing, installing, managing software licenses

Compliance with software licensing requirements is mandatory by U.S. Code, Department of Defense, and Air Force

To ensure Columbus Air Force Base and all subordinate units comply with these requirements, strict controls have been put in place. Procedures on how to acquire, install, track, and inventory software are just a few examples of these

Should an individual or unit require software for their government system, they would need to contact their Cybersecurity Liaison to open a Remedy Ticket to obtain authorization for installation. The Base Software License Management will obtain an Authority to Connect and will request a quote from an authorized vendor. The quote will then be provided to the unit CSL to start the ordering process.

Upon receipt of the software, the unit CSL will be notified that the software is available through the Media Sign-Out process. This allows for the installations to be performed up to the limit of the licenses purchased for that unit, while maintaining the software in a secure environment when not required by the unit. Use vESD, located on your desktop, to create a ticket for installation of software.

Click software and open the Software Wizard. The option for "Install Software" should be available for the requestor to create a ticket and provide the name of the software they are requesting in the Comments field. Once a technician receives the ticket, they will work with the BSLM office to ensure

A copy of the software order containing the number of there are available licenses and to acquire the media for installation. After the software has been installed, the software is to be returned to the BSLM office. A record of the number of installations against the number of purchased licenses will be maintained in order to verify compliance with the software licensing agreement.

Maintaining software licenses and inventories are a responsibility users, BSLMs, and the 14th Communications Squadron all have a part in. Without each doing their part. non-compliance with laws and applicable guidance will quickly follow. Never load personally owned software onto government systems and never make copies of software without permission of the copyright owner. U.S. Copyright Act. The E-8C Joint Surveillance Target Attack Radar System, or JSTARS, is an airborne battle management, command and control, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance platform. Its primary mission is to provide theater ground and air commanders with ground surveillance to support attack operations and targeting that contributes to the delay, disruption and destruction of enemy forces.

Features

The E-8C is a modified Boeing 707-300 series commercial airframe extensively remanufactured and modified with the radar, communications, operations and control subsystems required to perform its operational mission. The most prominent external feature is the 27-foot long, canoe-shaped radome under the forward fuselage that houses the 24-foot long, side-looking phased

The radar and computer subsystems on the E-8C can gather and display detailed battlefield information on ground forces. The information is relayed in near-real time to the Army and Marine Corps common ground stations and to other ground command, control, communications, computers and intelligence, or C4I, nodes.

As a battle management and command and control asset, the E-8C can support the full spectrum of roles and missions from peacekeeping operations to major theater war.

Backaround

Joint STARS evolved from Army and Air Force programs to develop, detect, locate and attack enemy armor at ranges beyond the forward area of troops. The first two developmental aircraft deployed in 1991 to Operation Desert Storm and also supported Operation Joint Endeavor in December 1995.

Team JSTARS men and women have contributed tremendously to overseas contingency operations, flying more than 85,000 combat hours in support of Operations Enduring Freedom, Iraqi Freedom, New Dawn Odyssey Dawn, and Unified Protector. Their operational resume includes support of six Combatant Commands including U.S. Pacific Command, U.S. Northern Command and U.S. Southern Command, U.S. Africa Command, U.S. Europe Command.


