

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

KEESLER AIR FORCE BASE, Miss. A demonstration of a new live multimedia conference system took place at the Bay Breeze Event Center here Feb. 6.

The new system provides the wing commander the ability to directly reach Airmen through a live broadcast to locations around

"The purpose of the Multimedia Broadcast System is to give the wing commander the capability to reach out to as much as the base populace as possible," said 1st Lt. Joseph Votto, 81st Communications Squadron plans and programs officer in charge. "There is no one auditorium that meets the space requirement for all Keesler permanent party, let alone students. This system enables the same message to be delivered to multiple venues,

There are five locations on base that will be able to use the system which includes: The second and third floor of the BBEC, Welch Theater, Roberts Maintenance Facility and the Don Wylie Auditorium.

"There are several applications that have been discussed, such as, large training events, professional development opportunities and Dragon Week activities," said Maj.



Williams reminds 17-05 graduates of importance of what they do

Maj. Gen. Brett Williams, U.S. Air Force retired, visited Columbus Air Force Base, Mississippi, for Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 17-05's graduation where he delivered the keynote address at Kaye Auditorium Feb. 10, 2017.

Before retiring in 2014, Williams was the Director of Operations, J-3, for United States Cyber Command, Fort Meade, Maryland. He was responsible for the operations and defense of specified Department of Defense information networks as well as the ability to conduct full-spectrum military cyberspace operations in support of U.S. National Security Objectives.

The general began his speech by thanking those in attendance, including Col. Douglas Gosney, 14th Flying Training Wing Commander, for the privilege of being there, Team BLAZE for the work they do at Columbus AFB, the instructor pilots for their hard work, and the parents for supporting their sons and daughters through SUPT.

"To the parents, spouses, family, maybe even soon-to-be spouses and everyone who contributed to getting these men and one woman through pilot training, I want to thank you," Williams said.

Williams spent the rest of his time telling SUPT Class 17-05 different stories from his career of being an F-15C pilot that helped him throughout his career.

"You literally put your lives in the hands of the people who maintain your airplane," Williams said. "Take the time to get to know the people who maintain your airplane."

Williams spoke about how getting to know your maintainers is so important. He said that they have to understand what your mission is and connect the dots on why what they are doing matters to every single pilot.

He then spoke about the importance of the Airman's Creed

"I am an American Airman, in this case I am also a Saudi Airman. [Referring to the Saudi Arabian students in the graduating class] I am a warrior. I have answered my nation's call," Williams said. "Later in the creed it says, I defend my country with my life. Well that is not what I was thinking about when I going to fly a cool F-15!"

Space-A: How to hop

IOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-RAN-DOLPH, Texas — One of the motivating factors to join the Air Force for many service members is the possibility to travel the

Whether it be through permanent changand time of sign up will be honored. es of station, temporary duty assignments or deployments, most Airmen get that opportunity, but another option available for service members is Space-Available flights, or Space-A.

Here is a step-by-step process from Airman 1st Class Aaron Blaylock, 502nd Logistics Readiness Squadron passenger service agent at the Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland Passenger Terminal, on how to travel Space-A:

• Step 1: Sign up

Blaylock said if service members are interested in traveling Space-A soon, the best way to get started is by coming to the terminal or calling to get information.

The Passenger terminal is located at 407 S. Frank Luke Dr. and can be contacted by phone at 210-925-8715/8714 Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Those wishing to travel must fill out an AMC Form 140, which can be found on the Air Force e-publishing website or the

Air Mobility Command website. The form can be submitted in person or by email at 502LRS.LGRDAS.SPACEA@us.af.mil

Emails do not receive a reply and travelers are encouraged to bring a digital or printed copy of the message to the terminal on the day of the flight, and the documented date

"Sign up is good for 60 days, and you can sign up at as many AMC terminals as you'd like," Blaylock added.

Blaylock said the two most common destinations from the IBSA-Lackland Passenger Terminal are Travis Air Force Base, Calif. and Joint Base Andrews, Md.

If a flier's final destination is not Travis or Andrews, Blaylock recommends signing up with the respective passenger terminal as well so they are not getting a fresh sign up date upon their arrival.

• Step 2: Find a flight

A 72-hour schedule is posted on the JB-SA-Lackland Passenger Terminal Facebook page and is updated regularly.

"Let's say it's Wednesday and we post flight for Friday," Blaylock said. "If you're looking for that, I'd check our schedule each day and make sure it's not canceling out or rerouting and show up the morning of the

A "roll call" time will be posted with the 72-hour schedule on Facebook. Blaylock said show times typically last about 40 minutes, and once it closes out, nobody can mark themselves present for the flight.

• Step 3: Selection process

To be considered for a flight, travelers must be on leave, have their Form 988 and Common Access Card. Since Space-A seating is limited, Tech. Sgt. Joseph Bedson, 502nd LRS NCO in charge of passenger services, recommends travelers give themselves some buffer time with leave, and added that lodging is available across the street if they happen to miss a flight

Kelly Inn is located on 250 Goodrich Dr. and can be contacted at 210-925-1844.

Priority for seating goes by date and time of sign up from categories one to six, beginning with Category 1. Category 3, active duty on ordinary leave, and Category 6, retired military, Reservists and Air National Guard members, are the most popular categories to fly out of the JBSA-Lackland Passenger Ter-

Blaylock said an important thing to note for military dependents is they cannot travel Space-A without their sponsor unless they receive a letter signed by their sponsor's command. For more information on dependent Space-A travel and the travel status categories, visit the AMC website.

• Step 4: Check-in

Once travelers have been selected for a flight, they will be asked to go through the terminal's magnetometer and x-ray machine. The terminal follows all of the Transportation Security Administration's guidelines

F-35A stealth brings flexibility to battlespace

Multirole capabilities of the F-35A Lightning II is proving to be a game changer in Nevada

NELLIS AIR FORCE BASE, Nev. — Stealth isn't new in the Air Force; but stealth combined with the multirole capabilities of the F-35A Lightning II is proving to be a game changer in the Nevada desert.

Units from across the Air Force have converged here for Red Flag 17-1, the Air Force's premier air combat exercise, which pits a friendly force against an aggressor force in scenarios designed to give pilots true-to-life experiences before heading into actual combat

Military strategists have long noted that while the United States has invested heavily in combat aircraft technology, potential adversaries have pushed their capital toward advanced surface-to-air missiles in integrated air defense systems. Planners say any realistic large-force exercise must test the Air Force's ability to survive and suppress these sophisticated systems.

That is what the Airmen of the 388th and 419th Fighter Wings from Hill Air Force Base, Utah, bring to the fight with the combat-capable F-35A.

"During this Red Flag we're training against the highest level threats we know exist," said Lt. Col. George Watkins, the 34th Fighter Squadron commander. "Just as we're getting new systems and technology, the adversary's threats are becoming more sophisticated and capable."

Fourth-generation aircraft, such as the F-16 Fighting Falcon, F-15 Eagle, F/A-18 Hornet, A-10 Thunderbolt II and others, cannot operate in an environment where they are targeted by advanced anti-air systems with sophisticated radar and infrared capabilities.

Red Flag planners are tasking the F-35A with taking out these threats and the aircraft's stealth capability is proving pilots can survive and operate effectively where others cannot.

"I flew a mission the other day where our four-ship formation of F-35As destroyed five surface-to-air threats in a 15-minute fight. period without being targeted once," said

In past Red Flags, the friendly force did not have the capability to directly target advanced surface-to-air missile threats with an aircraft like the F-35A. Exercise planners would engage the targets with long range "standoff" weapons – like tomahawk missiles – before sending aircraft in to the

"We would shoot everything we had at Schmidt said.

multirole F-35A is able to "pitch back into the fight" with air-to-air missiles, taking out aircraft that don't even know they're there,

This is the largest exercise to date for the combat pilots of Hill's 34th Fighter Squadron and they're learning to believe in what the multirole fighter can do in combat, said Maj. Shad Stromberg, a 419th FW Reserve F-35 pilot.

"After almost every mission, we shake our heads and smile, saying 'We can't be-After taking out the ground threats, the lieve we just did that'," Schmidt said. "We flew right into the heart of the threat and were able to bring all of our jets back out with successful strikes. It's like we hit the 'I Believe' button again after every sortie."

Ten facts about Black History Month

February marks an annual observance known as Black History Month. The month inspires many to learn about the culminated achievements by black Americans.

Below are ten facts about Black History Month to share:

1 – Black History Month, also known as African American History Month, is an annual celebration of achievements by African Americans and a time for recognizing the central role they have played in the history of the United States.

2 – In June 1839, Joseph Cinque and 53 others were abducted from their home in Sierra Leone by Portuguese slave traders. Aboard the schooner Amistad, Cinque led a successful revolt against the crew. On March 9, 1841, the U.S. Su-

preme Court freed the 35 Africans who survived the ordeal and cleared their passage back to their home on the West

3 – Charles Lenox Remond was one of the earliest recorded black abolitionist speakers. At 18, he traveled from his home in Massachusetts to London for the World Anti-Slavery Convention and remained abroad for many years to lecture on abolition in universities across the United Kingdom.

During the Civil War, he recruited black citizens and helped to staff the first two all-black units from Massachusetts.

4 – The Montgomery Bus Boycott began when Rosa Parks, a black protestor, refused to give up her seat for a white man on the bus. Parks was a politically active member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People long before her actions on that day and came from a family of activists. On that day in 1955, the unassuming actions of the "Mother of the Civil Rights Movement" echoed throughout the country.

5 – Jean Baptiste Point du Sable is known as the first settler of present-day Chicago. As a merchant and farmer of the region, Point du Sable established both a prosperous farm in an area otherwise unsettled and an affable relationship with local Native American tribes. After the Revolutionary War, his farm prospered greatly. Travelers as far as the East Coast knew of the Point du Sable.

6 – The largest plantation house in Florida is the Kingsley Plantation on Fort George Island. The main house was built by slaves in 1738, and was sold to Zephaniah Kingsley and his African wife, Anna Madgigine Iai in 1815. When the U.S. gained possession of Florida in 1821, Kingsley fought against laws that greatly prohibited the activities of both free and enslaved blacks and even wrote a major treatise on the subject. Even though he owned slaves, he was a strong believer in treating people according to their abilities, not Kentucky, Virginia and Maryland.

The T-6A Texan II is a single-engine, two-seat primary trainer designed to train Primary Pilot Training, or PPT, students in basic flying skills common to U.S. Air Force pilots.

Background

Before being formally named in 1997, the T-6A was identified in a 1989 Department of Defense Trainer Aircraft Master Plan as the aircraft portion of the Primary Aircraft Training System, or PATS. The system includes a suite of simulators, Vance AFB, Oklahoma; and Laughlin and Sheppard AFBs in training devices and a training integration management sys- Texas.



In my view, the primary prevention concepts used in the Green Dot program have the opportunity to become some of the biggest grassroots movements in our foreseeable future in the way we go after the problem of interpersonal violence. With the Green Dot program applying primary prevention concepts, we can take the power back and create the culture we want in the Air Force. We have the power to make perpetrators ineffective in their efforts to commit these crimes.

In 2017, look for our expanded application of primary prevention to include our comprehensive primary prevention strategy for Columbus Air Force Base, Mississippi The primary prevention program will continue to grow and evolve. 
