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



Algerian triplets join Air Force for better future

SCOTT AIR FORCE BASE, Ill. — For one Algerian family, 6,600 miles was the distance between a life of struggle, promise and opportunity.

Their journey has carried them over thousands of miles, from a barren region in Africa to California's Simi Valley where eventually the Harchaoui triplets — Myriam, Rabah and Warda — would join the U.S. Air Force. Scott Air Force Base is now home to Myriam, who recently reflected on her unique journey.

"Growing up we were very poor," said Airman Myriam Harchaoui, a 436th Supply Chain Operations Squadron C-130 stock control apprentice. "Our mom fought for us to move to the states because of life (in Algeria). It was like the movies — a desert with a ton of beat-up buildings."

Her mother, Brigit Wilcox, arrived in California at first with just the three boys in the family, leaving Myriam and her sister, Warda, in the care of grandparents. They were not able to come at the same time because the government only allowed the boys to leave, but when the girls reached age 5, they were able to join their family.

When they arrived they didn't know how to speak English and had to adjust to the different culture. Myriam said she was able to pick up the language quickly, and Warda, now an Airman assigned to the 60th Medical Operations Squadron at Travis AFB, California, said she learned the language through the Boys and Girls Club.

Their brother, Rabah, who is an Airman assigned to the 56th Security Forces Squadron, at Luke AFB, Arizona, was age 2 when he moved so it's all he's really known.

"Growing up here gave me a lot of opportunities and it has been a blessing so far," he said.

After graduating high school, the Harchaouis saw the Air Force as a good option because their older brother, Sofiane, had served six years as an F-16 avionics specialist.

Additionally, the triplets were a part of their high school's Junior ROTC, so they were introduced to the idea of the military early.

In 2016, they each raised their right hand in commitment to the Air Force, and they each had their own reason for doing so.

Myriam said, "When I was younger I always wanted to join since the government had done so much for us and getting my family to the states, that I saw it as a way to give

Warda and Rabah said they saw the opportunities the

knowing what I wanted to do, and I saw what the Air Force in heart."

For Rabah, the military was a stepping stone for life after high school that could also provide college opportunities.

Even with all of the benefits the military life has offered, Myriam said this has been the longest they have been apart since those early years, and it has been difficult for them and especially their mother. Still, she has remained very supportive of their decisions.

"It went from all of us being together at home to everyone being gone," Myriam said. "It was a fast change for her, but she is okay with it because having our brother already serve, she knew the military would take care of us. It has been hard, but she has been very optimistic because she has always wanted the best for us and she pushed us to be

The distance that comes with being members of the military has been tough on the family, but it has also helped strengthen the bond between them. The triplets stay in touch with each other through a group chat where they talk every day, said Myriam.

Rabah added, "We always communicate which has made it easier to get through some of the tough times in "Having a single mother with five children, we couldn't the military so far. Communication has been key. We can all be put through college," Warda said. "I wanted to avoid all motivate each other, and we are in this together. Even the mistake of going through college right away and not though we aren't under the same roof, we are still together

us another versatile way to guide the weapon, specifically, through inclement weather onto targets," Scott said.

The JDAM being added to the arsenal is another step in furthering the attack capabilities of the MO-9 Reaper force. "There's definitely times when I could've used the GBU-38 in combat prior to this," Scott said.

Not only does the GBU-38 perform through poor weather conditions, it also helps the munitions Airmen and the weapons load crew members who load them.

"The GBU-38 has a 20 minute load time compared to the GBU-12, which has a 30 minute load time," said Senior Airman Curtis, a 432nd Aircraft Maintenance Squadron load crew member. "The GBU-38 is a quicker load compared to the GBU-12 and gets the plane in the air quicker."

Incorporating this new munition into the total strike package will give MQ-9 aircrews additional capabilities.

"Our job at the weapons school is to train to the highest standard possible," Scott said. "We're going to take the GBU-38 and incorporate it into our advanced scenarios, prove the weapon and integrate with all Air Force assets. What that gives us is the ability to take it downrange and employ in the most demanding circumstances possible."

The JDAM will add flexibility and efficiency to the targeting process. Aircrews will continue to employ the AGM-114 Hellfires and GBU-12s downrange in addition to the GBU-38 that is now ready for combat.

"The overall impact of the GBU-38 is aircrew will have more versatility for the commanders to provide different effects and make a difference for the guys on the ground," Scott said. "It has a different guidance system and it opens the bridge to more GPS-guided weapons in the future."

Hurricane Hunters prepare the Caribbean

KEESLER AIR FORCE BASE, Miss. —More than 20,000 people attended the Caribbean Hurricane Awareness Tour hosted April 24-29, 2017 by the 53rd Weather Reconnaissance Squadron "Hurricane Hunters" and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The annual tour is held to share the mission of the Hurricane Hunters and raise hurricane awareness across Latin America and the Caribbean, said Maj. Brad Roundtree, the 53rd WRS aircraft commander for the tour.

The Hurricane Hunters traveled with officials from NOAA's National Hurricane Center, which included Dr. Rick Knabb, the NHC director, Lixion Avila, an NHC senior hurricane specialist, and John Pavone, the chief of aerial reconnaissance coordination. The group stopped at five locations including Mérida, Mexico; San Pedro Sula, Honduras: Grand Cavman, Turk and Caicos: and Aguadilla, Puerto Rico.

During the CHAT, the public toured one of 10 WC-130J Super Hercules aircraft flown by the 53rd WRS. The aircrew gave demonstrations of the equipment used to collect storm data and explained how the data is used, said Maj. Kimberly Spusta, a 53rd WRS aerial reconnaissance weather officer.

"Once the data is collected, it is given to the NHC in real-time via satellite from the plane," said Spusta. That information is then inserted into a model that generates storm forecasts and allows local governments to issue proper and timely weather advisories and warnings to the public.

"Some people see that we do a hurricane awareness tour in the Caribbean and may think it's just an airshow, but it's so much more than that," said Spusta. "We are really getting into communities that don't have access to hurricane readiness information, and that is very rewarding."

The Hurricane Hunters and NHC officials also took part and having a plan before a storm comes. in several interviews with local media, attended press conferences with local government officials, and spoke to the public on the importance of being prepared before a storm comes, said Roundtree.



Tricare Online (TOL) PATIENT PORTAL **SECURE MESSAGING**

The Air Force Medical Service is excited to announce the new name of our secure messaging system and the recent merger with TRICARE Online. TOL Patient Portal Secure Messaging, the Military's online confidential secure messaging service, can now be reached from either the federal platform of RelayHealth, https://mil.relayhealth.com/ or by the TRICARE Online link at https://app.mil.relayhealth.com/security/login/default.aspx?bid=DHA

This system has been shown to significantly reduce the number of phone calls between patients and providers, increase patient satisfaction, and save time for the medical office staff and the patient. The AFMS aim is to enroll as many patients as possible into TOL Patient Portal Secure Messaging and utilize secure messaging as the primary form of communication between patients and their healthcare teams.

Patients currently enrolled in Patient Portal Secure Messaging have commented on the ease, accessibility, and benefits of this Internet-based service. One Patient Portal Secure Messaging enrollee said, "it is always empowering to be able to communicate via the Internet about routine health issues – and can very well prevent visits to the clinic..." Another enrolled patient said Patient Portal Secure Messaging "will answer lots of questions and save so much time for both doctors and patients."

On TOL Patient Portal Secure Messaging, patients can request appointments with healthcare providers, get test results, request prescription refills, or ask their healthcare team medical questions via a secure electronic message that bypasses phone-trees, voicemail, and phone tag. The TOL Patient Portal Secure Messaging merger continues to provide secure messaging and now includes easy access to beneficiaries' Blue Button Personal Health Record.

To register, patients should visit or call their Militaty Treatment Facility (MTF) to initiate the face-to-face registration, e-registration, or telephone registeration process. Patients will need to verify their military enrollment eligibility and provide basic information such as name, social security number, birthday and email address. An email will be sent for patients to finish enrollment and confidential messaging may begin.

TOL Patient Portal Secure Messaging has been designed to support patients and healthcare teams and has been implemented DoD-wide, so once registered, a patient will remain in the system—no matter where the Air Force takes them.

The MO-9 Reaper is an armed, multi-mission, medium-altitude, long-endurance remotely piloted aircraft that is employed primarily as an intelligence-collection asset and secondarily against dynamic execution targets. Rainy days don't stop Team BLAZE

Weather can be tricky to predict and it takes highly trained professionals to read the signs and make the call to fly or not to fly.

The 14th Operations Support Squadron's Weather Flight is charged with communicating the weather so Team BLAZE can produce pilots and protect its re-

"We touch everything, even the commissary," said Staff Sgt. Ramon Curtis, Noncommissioned Officer in Charge of Mission Services. "If there is lightning within a certain distance we have to make sure the back-up generators are ready for a power outage."

The 14th OSS Weather Flight uses different technology to cover a 300 nautical-mile area to give accurate forecasts. The 557th Weather Wing, Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska, and the 26th Operational Weather Squadron, Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiof different weather systems. Locally, they have radar tasked with watching for weather formations that indithat is placeable in the middle of a thunderstorm or a tornadoes per year. tornado and see the cell core.

One of their most common tasks is answering the calls from pilots for their return weather.

"When the pilots are out at other places, they call to get their return weather to get back here," said Staff Sgt. Aimee Boxell, Noncommissioned Officer in Charge of Airfield Services. "We are still responsible from another place."

Another task for the team is resource protection from severe weather such as thunderstorms, hail and tornadoes.

A thunderstorm can have strong winds and lightning that could knockout power to the base. If the winds become too strong, they could flip planes and cause a lot of damage. Hail storms can also do a lot of damage to exposed aircraft on the flight line, which ana, provide programs to the flight to see a plethora could halt pilot production. > "Resource protection is a big thing," Boxell said. "We produce the (14th Flying Training Wing) weather advisories in order to help prepare for bad weather."

The weather team is always challenged by Mississippi's "peculiar" weather, Boxell said. She also included that Columbus flies over 300 sorties a day, which means all of those pilots need to know their departure and for their weather, whether they are taking off here or landing conditions. In addition to that, the pilots in training easily confuse "weather talk" and "pilot talk."

Even with their challenges, the weather team still manages to be a vital part in the mission to Produce Pilots, Advance Airmen and Feed the Fight.
